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The Networking Classroom:

"Networking Cultures for Christ"

The church has always been about networking. Evangelism, discipleship, love—its all about people connecting with people and sharing the truth. Although today, with 42.9 million cell phones, 4.6 million Internet users, all firing endless gigabytes of information to and from the tiny archipelago that 96.1 million Filipinos call home*... networking has become emphasized like never before.

This semester, APNTS has seen the beginnings of new opportunities for networking around the world with the recent opening of "The Networking Classroom." This high-tech classroom provides twelve desktop computers connected to the Internet for dynamic classroom activities, wireless Internet access for laptops, video conferencing with other colleges and universities in the region and beyond, classroom collaboration as well as a multi-media teaching station.

APNTS Professor Rovina Hatcher, with help from the Asia-Pacific Resource Center (APRC), has been leading the "Networking Classroom" project on the third floor of the Nielson Center, Hatcher emphasizes that "Networking is what the internationalism of the church is all about—the dynamic interflow of ideas from one place to another within the whole body of Christ" She notes the great importance for seminary students

Engaging the NOW: Cyber Mission

With an audience of 500 million active users checking out spiritual and religious sites, the Internet represents a vast new frontier for missions. APNTS professor Robert Donahue notes that these numbers are only the beginning as usage is expected to double in the next five years. "This is a seismic change that is now taking place in the computer world."

With these "seismic changes" must come equally powerful changes in the way the church goes about missions. "Cyber Missions" has become the working definition for an new frontier in missions that intends to take advantage of the valuable resources provided by the Internet. Cybercommunities such as Facebook and Friendster, as well as blog-rings, and even face-to-face video chatting are only widening the horizons for missions in the 21st century. Cyber Missions means the opening of doors that have long been closed to the gospel. Donahue notes, "Currently, there are more than 40 nations in the world where Cyber Missions could become the main way of doing missions due to the restriction of traditional means." With the Internet's rapid growth and seemingly unlimited potential, Cyber Mission provides a new evolution for an age old commission to "go and make disciples."

FastFacts

Even before the historic "merger" 100 years ago in Pilot Point, the Church of the Nazarene encouraged both men and women to pursue God's calling into ministry. Phineas Bresee, the Church's Founder, is often quoted saying, "Some of our best 'men' are women!" What Does Your Computer Do For You?

How do you use your computer? To write e-mails? Shop online? Or maybe to keep up-to-date with family and friends? How about to save lives—or to preserve the innocence of a child? If you are like most people... this is probably not on the daily computing agenda. However, this is exactly the aim of recent endeavors at APNTS.

For many in the world, learning computer skills means jobs, security, and hope for a better life. To combat the growing problem of trafficking of teen-age girls and young women, APNTS is partnering with Philippine Children's Ministry Network, other non-government organizations, and Microsoft's Community Technology Skills Program in step-UP (Stop Trafficking and Exploitation of People with [Microsoft's] Unlimited Potential—Community Technology Skills Program). The goal of step-UP is to offer technology and life-skills training to help integrate disadvantaged youth into the work force, and avoid the tragedy of trafficking.

Human trafficking is a major concern in the Philippines. Children and young women are trafficked from the rural areas to the cities and areas abroad for sexual exploitation and often forced into domestic labor and work in factories. Sometimes they come out of their own volition with promises of "big" money but later are exploited. The government and NGOs estimate that upwards of 400,000 women and 100,000 children are trafficked abroad from the Philippines [Source: humantrafficking.org].

Through partnership in this program, APNTS hopes to assist in bringing holistic restoration as well as divine redemption to abused or potentially traf-



ficked youth. Microsoft is providing the curriculum and software licenses for Community Technology Centers in local organizations committed to providing training for youth. In addition, graduates will receive a certificate from Microsoft indicating their proficiency in the courses attended.

"We want to reach our community as a part of our outreach program, being relevant to [their] needs..." says Calm Mijares, a member of the ad hoc committee for this partnership. "Computer literacy certificate sponsorship is a way of helping and providing for those children in need, giving them opportunity to find work in spite of their difficulties."

The first level of the Microsoft curriculum involving computing fundamentals, word processing, presentation skills, and spreadsheet fundamentals was held on September 19 in the newly opened Networking Classroom. A follow-up two-day workshop for trainers is scheduled on November 13-14 at APNTS and will include digital media fundamentals, Internet, web design, and database fundamentals.
