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"Bridging" the Creek

Flowing through the center of the APNTS compound, "The Creek" has become a nearly iconic symbol for seminary students. A simple paved bridge crosses the creek, providing the main thoroughfare by which students go to class each day. However, down the banks of the rushing waters, there lies another bridge that is still under construction. It is not a bridge of metal or stone; in fact, this bridge doesn't look like a bridge at all. Actually, this is a bridge composed of relationships... and a concrete trash bin.

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Sitio Rowenas is a community whose story is very seldom told. Nestled just behind APNTS compound, it is an economically deprived area of people who have made their dwellings on the banks of the creek that flows through campus. Most of the students on campus know the settlement as "the Creek Community." The creek provides most of the water for thr community's daily living needs for cooking, bathing, swimming and washing. However, many in the community, as well those upstream, have used the creek for other, less healthful things: such as the disposal of garbage and human waste. The inadequate waste management has given rise to many health concerns for the people of the community, not to mention serious environmental issues. These concerns led the APNTS Student Body Organization (SBO) to lend a helping hand to the Rowenas Community.

October 6th was a full day of work and ministry in the Rowenas community. The APNTS SBO partnered with local community members to build a large trash receptacle to contain the community's daily trash, keeping it from being thrown into the creek. The project was funded by the evangelism and compassion fund of the school's SBO.

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Bridging Cultures for Christ

Beyond the building of the trash receptacle, a guest speaker offered community development training to adults, while SBO council members gave snacks to the children of the community. "The people were overjoyed with our presence there," says Michelle Lopez, one of the students involved.

Although it looks like a simple trash receptacle, in actuality it is far more than just that. The project represents relationships and a partnership with this often forgotten community. "The main goal of this ministry is to build relationships and connect with our community," says SBO Chair for Evangelism and Compassionate Ministry Pedrito Cainglet. The SBO plans a follow up visit for sometime next semester to build relationships and to offer additional training for the people in Rowenas to help improve life within the community and for the surrounding environment.

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The bridge to the community is still under construction., but progress is well under way. With ICF, a Nazarene Church located on campus, the campus is open to the community every week.. So far, 16 have been baptized, and the relationship continues to grow.

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Preparing for the Silver Celebration:

A few "fixes" for the 25th Anniversary

"It's been busy," says newly-hired General Services Manager Eric Sanchez. The past few weeks have been teeming with projects to be completed, as the school prepares to celebrate it's 25th anniversary. Sanchez in charge of overseeing the preparations underway for the celebration. Currently, the campus is undergoing seven simultaneous campus improvement projects, four of which Sanchez calls his "priority projects."

Perhaps the most notable of these projects has been the renovation of the basketball court () which has involved clearing out remaining walls from former buildings, expanding the court and rebuilding barrier walls. A temporary tent and stage along with temporary lighting is being installed for anniversary presentations and musical groups. Sanchez notes that after the celebration the long-term plan will be to make it a permanently covered court with outside access available for the community. The first floor of the Nielson Center is receiving new baseboard (2) and trim work with the help of a Work and Witness team from Idaho College Church which is also undertaking other projects around the APNTS compund.

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Elsewhere on campus, the Dining Hall is receiving a restructuring as well. Major changes include the completion of the outer terrace, laying bricks, completing the entrance and exterior as well as adding handicapped access to the entrance (4), along with a new color scheme for the interior and two new stoves provided by the Nampa Work and Witness Team.

The Wooten Chapel is also undergoing some changes as a new color scheme is applied, new lighting is installed, and the backwall is restructured to incorporate the new design (3).

These are just a few of the changes that the school is undergoing as it prepares for the hundreds of guests expected for its silver anniversary

celebration. 🥘
