

tudent, Pastor, Politician, and Parent—APNTS student Bonifacio Plantilla (Pastor Oni) stood up on January 10th, at the Metro-Manila District Assembly, and took on yet another role: District Superintendent.

Pastor Oni's story is long and diverse. From early in his years at Visayan Nazarene Bible College (VNBC), Oni has been no stranger to leadership and ministry. In 1997, he also took courses in law, and shortly after his graduation, he found himself in dual positions of leadership: a Nazarene pastor in Valenzuela City, and a Political Affairs Officer in the Philippine Congress.

After 8 years of politics and part-time pastoring, Oni felt the distinct "tug" on his heart leading him into further preparation for full-time ministry. Walking away from power, position, and a hearty paycheck, Oni accepted the Lord's proposition. He resigned his job, gathered his

things, and made the transition to APNTS, having faith that the Lord had a plan.

The Lord did have a plan. Oni engaged into full-time student work as a Master of Divinity student at APNTS, but for a person like Pastor Oni, it wasn't long until he was fully engaged in leadership and ministry on the Metro-Manila Nazarene District. "Here, I became assistant to the president (of APNTS) and associate pastor of Taytay Nazarene," he recalls. As associate under Pastora Luz Tamayo he has been taking care of many administrative tasks, especially for the live and growing youth ministry developing at Taytay Nazarene.

When asked how APNTS has equipped him for his ministry, his answer came as no surprise. Noting that he came from a noisy world of business, he responds, "I learned how to keep silent, to meditate and listen to the Lord."

Oni admits that there is a certain power in silence and meditation. He continues, "every pastor should come here, maybe not just to learn—but to learn to keep silent. Sometimes we don't have time to listen. We just talk."

This is certainly wisdom that he intends to carry into the next chapter of his ministry as he takes on the leadership of the Metro-Manila District Church of the Nazarene. As a seasoned leader, he looks forward to the planting of more churches on the district, and the nurturing of new leadership from within the laity. Beyond this, he and his wife Nenita also look ahead to the leadership of their newborn daughter, "Juris-Joyce," as they both continue to follow the Lord's call in leadership and ministry.

Before any questions were asked, and without any prompting, Dr. Charles Seifert leaned forward in his seat and confessed, "This is the capstone of my teaching career."


ISSF Inter-Seminary Sports Festival
